- Please name all of your child's clothing either with a permanent pen or by purchasing named tapes.








Snack

- Children have access to water throughout the day and we encourage them to drink regularly.
- Please ensure bottles are labelled clearly.
- The children are offered a healthy snack during the morning session (this is provided by the school fruit and vegetable scheme).
- Children are entitled to a daily drink of milk up until their fifth birthday, this is provided by school. If you want them to have milk after that, you can choose to pay for it using the milk scheme.







Learning Through Play

Why play? Play underpins all development and learning for young children.

A Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum

•Activities in Reception are carefully planned and organised in order to provide a range of learning experiences.

•We learn through play.

•We use Evidence Me and Floor Books to record the activities your child participates in and undertakes, as well as their progress in specific skills.

•Planning for each week and term is carried out using a topic-based approach, following the children's interests and responding to specific events.



•There are 7 Areas of Learning in the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS), which activities are planned around:

• Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- Physical Development
- Communication and Language
- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

•Throughout the EYFS, children will be working towards the Early Learning Goals. These describe the level of attainment expected at the end of your child's reception year in school.

Some Key Changes to EYFS this year

- Reduced the amount of unneeded written recordings and assessment of children by staff.
- There is more of an emphasis on the importance of developing communication and language skills (the basis for all learning – building up vocabulary)
- There is a focus on how reading stories is important to help children develop in all of Areas of Learning.
- There is a focus on encouraging healthy choices overall and an understanding of oral health.

Literacy and Phonics

Phonics teaching is moving to the Little Wandle Letters and Sounds scheme in September.

Phonics is a way of teaching children how to read and write. It helps children hear, identify and use different sounds that distinguish one word from another in the English language.

Written language can be compared to a code, so knowing the sounds of individual letters and how those letters sound when they're combined will help children decode words as they read.

Understanding phonics will also help children know which letters to use when they are writing words.


Reading

- Your child will be given a reading book as we begin our phonics programme. The book will be taken home each week to be practised at home.
- Keywords will also come home to practise
- Your child needs to be reading regularly at home.
- Storytime is vital. It builds self-esteem, concentration, vocabulary, feeds imagination and even improves their sleeping patterns.
- We will be going to the library each week to choose a story that you can read at home.


Maths Mastery

Develop a deep knowledge of numbers to ten

- Dive deep into each number understand the oneness of one count
- Use language associated with numbers once, first
- Represent numbers in different ways
- Understand how numbers are composed
- Subitise
- See patterns in numbers







Our daily routine

- We come straight in at our classroom gate/door in the morning. Children come in independently.
- We have short carpet times in the morning linked to phonics and maths (more information on this will come in September)
- We go to the library once a week.
- Lunchtime we go to the hall and can have a school dinner (these are provided for all children in EYFS and KS1) or you can provide a pack lunch (no nuts please).
- Afternoon we do PE, Wild Area sessions, topic work or literacy.

Can I listen to my adult read me a bedtime story?






Can I use my words to share toys?

What do I need to do as a carer?

- A fully labelled uniform (including shoes!)
- A named water bottle
- A named book bag
- A suitable coat (named)
- PE Kit (all named)
- Spare wellies to keep at school
- Complete any forms in the booklet that are needed
- Enjoy the summer with them, talk to them and prepare them for school. Interaction is key! Preparation is vital, explain to them what is going to happen and that you will be back to collect them. There may be tears on the first day but we are experts in coaxing and settling the children so please don't worry ⁽³⁾
