





Cake Recipes



Introduction

The Industrial revolution was when people ate more people started shipping of clever inventions, and things started being made much more quickly on a much bigger scale. The Industrial revolution spread quickly in Europe, but another countries as well like America, Russia and Japan.

Bright as a lightbulb

In 1879, Thomas Edison invented & lit the Lightbulb. This invention changed many lives in Victoria's Britain because theft lit up mines, workhouses & import industry, and helped to fill houses. The lightbulb meant workers could work into the night safely. I might say to light a candle every night in mines, workhouses and homes, then imagine the lightbulb, cheap to fuel and safe, it made life a lot easier which was certainly an advantage in Britain. Although the lightbulb has been changed since the first invention, we still have never got this far since the first invention we still use even today.

London Underground

Living in an overcrowded street is in a coach at the money through all the businesses, people, businesses and houses. But then in 1863 a man called Sir T. Richard said to build a tunnel underground with a steam train going in it. The first underground railway line was the Metropolitan Magisterial which linked from Farringdon to Paddington. Each station had its own tube with their own station. Many stages of a day to work underground without all the fogs through smoke, dirty, busy, smelly, unclear streets, were seen as a impossible task.

As fast as a steam engine

The steam engine was a game-changing invention, without it we would have never had any steam trains. In 1698 Thomas Savery built a steam pump to raise water from the mines. By suction produced by condensing steam. In 1712, James Newcomen made a more efficient design with a piston separating the condensing steam from the water. In 1804 Richard Trevithick thought of using steam power for transport. He invented the first high pressure steam engine, which he ran on a circular demonstration track in London, giving an average of 12 mph (19 km/h), though he admitted that it could go 20 mph (32 km/h) on straight track. In 1825 it wasn't until 1829 that Sir George Stephenson decided to use rails for transporting people from Manchester to Liverpool, via Liverpool. Stephenson's rocket had 7000 horses of people get travel easier, quicker and safer to get to their destination. Trains have been changed slightly, from the first days of steam power to electric power, though steam power has been used for many inventions, from pumping boats to pumping water.

How Victorians shaped Britain

Strong as iron

Before iron working was invented people had to dig iron out of the ground and use it like they wanted. In 1709 Abraham Darby discovered a way to smelt iron. First he took sand to cover up the puddle. Then the sand would be repeated around iron off puddles, after that it would be made into pellets to be put in the blast furnace. Once the blast furnace made it hot enough, it would be dropped off a train to the next factory. Being able to melt iron sand that we can use to build railways, buildings and all sorts of other things out of a much harder, stronger metal.



Workers Rules

1. Small hands and aged over nine? Get a job in a factory (Factory Act 1833 prohibits children under nine working in factories)
2. Small and good at climbing? Until 1840 you could be a chimney sweep (The Chimney Sweepers and Chimneys Regulation Act of 1840)
3. Aged between 5 and 10? From 1880 you must go to school (Forster Elementary Act 1880)
4. Want to leave school? In 1893 you have to stay until you are thirteen, fourteen in 1918 (Elementary Education (School Attendance) Act 1893 and Fisher Act of 1918)
