# Hello Yellow



Across the school, classes participated in activities organised by School Council to raise awareness of World Mental Health Day.



#### Remembrance at St Oswald's

This half term, we have commemorated Remembrance Day at St Oswald's CE Primary School. As many of our families work within the armed forces, this is a particularly special day for us as a community. We have been able to share personal stories, thoughts and feelings about the events of the World Wars as well as conflicts that still continue today.



Children in Year 3/4 created beautiful pieces of art using watercolour backgrounds and layered poppies to remember those who died during the World Wars. We have displayed these in our Key Stage Two corridor, along with some words that we feel represent all those who served.

After taking part in a BBC Live poetry lesson, Nathaniel and Hugo (Year 5) were inspired to write their own poem about Remembrance Day.

It beautifully summarises the feelings of gratitude, respect and hope that we have all shared during our discussions about this special day.



On Friday, we came together as a school for our Remembrance Collective Worship. We have been working hard to practise a lovely song, 'Light a Candle', which we performed to parents and carers to spread our message of peace and hope. We were also delighted to welcome back Becky, John and Cliff who shared their own experiences of serving in the armed forces. We are always very grateful to hear their stories and to thank them for hosting our annual art competition inspired by Remembrance Day.



This year, it was the fantastic pieces of artwork produced by Annie (Year 3/4) and Noah (Year 5/6) who impressed our guests. Their names will be proudly presented on our 'Past and Present' plaque, alongside our previous years' winners.



## **Year 6 Houses of Parliament Trip!**

Here at St Oswald's Primary School, we don't just aim to provide children with an excellent education - we also want to provide our pupils with a wealth of experiences and memories that will last a lifetime.



Just before the Easter break, our Year 6 Debating Club run by Mr. Airey (Year 5/6) and Claire Sinclair (Chair of Governors) visited our capital city to see the Houses of Parliament. We took a guided tour of Parliament and sat in the public galleries in both the Houses of Lords and Commons, to observe democracy in action, before a workshop in the Parliamentary Education Centre. The

pupils were impeccably behaved throughout, asking thoughtful and considered questions and showed themselves to be real role-models for the school.

Earlier in the day, we had travelled to London by train, before a guided tour around London Bridge where we marvelled at the view across the city from the Glass Walkway at the top of Tower Bridge. This was an excellent opportunity for us to bring together some of our previous learning from units on topics such as the Great Fire of London and Monarchy.





Following our trip up London Bridge, we sailed up the Thames by boat, where we saw many of London's famous landmarks and got a good sense of the size and scale of our capital city, before arriving at Westminster Pier, by Big Ben in time for our tour and workshop.

We arrived back in York by 20:30 after dinner in Kings Cross Station and our train ride back. All of the adults who attended were incredibly proud of the pupils – we can't wait for next year!
